#### Workforce Outcome Narratives

- Individual-based measures
  - Unit of analysis: SSN
- Workforce outcomes
  - Outcome comparisons linked to program completion, but disconnected from labor market status
  - reference group comparisons are often misleading

- Job-based measures
  - Unit of analysis: pairing of SSN and Employer UI Account
- Workforce outcomes
  - Outcome comparisons link program completion to labor market status
  - labor market status enhances cross-sectional and timeseries reference group comparisons



**Enhanced Narrative** 


#### **Career Outcomes**

- Distinguish Career job from secondary job
  - Career job as highest paying job for three consecutive quarters
- Workforce connectivity for Career job
  - Job stability
    - Hire as start point
    - Separation as end point
- Earnings / Earnings Growth for Career job
  - Conventional measures understate earnings outcomes
    - Impact of partial employment on earnings
    - Impact of dual jobholding on earnings
  - Earning measures linked to job stability (apples to apples comparison)
- Career Pathways across Industries and time
  - Mapping career job flows industry and earnings
- Comparison between student outcomes to IL worker outcomes (US Bureau of Census)
  - Facilitates measures for return on investment
